

Aims and objectives of this session

Patient safety is a serious global public health concern. There is a 1 in a million chance of a person being harmed while travelling by plane. In comparison, there is a 1 in 300 chance of a patient being harmed during health care. Industries with a perceived higher risk such as the aviation and nuclear industries have a much better safety record than health care. Due to the following data:

- 1. As many as 1 in 10 patients are harmed whilst receiving health care internationally,
- 2. Approximately 43 million patient safety incidences occur every year and
- 3. Medication errors cost an estimated 42 billion USD annually (WHO, 2018), we, as urological nurses, should ask ourselves what we could do to protect our patients in clinical practice.

Aims and objectives of this session

Urostomy care remains a focus area over the years, in oncology and in functional as well as in paediatric urology.

In some cases, patients have a choice in what they want, e.g. a Bricker, a continent stoma or a bladder replacement like a Hautmann procedure. Making these choices is sometimes not easy. In the Netherlands a digital decision tool for oncology patients was made and researched (offering a choice between Bricker stoma or Hautmann procedure). The pros and cons of each therapy is described and the patient can see what best fits his/her lifestyle.

In functional and paediatric urology a continent stoma (Mitrofanoff/Monti), with or without a bladder augmentation is sometimes an option. Patients encounter specific problems, and a review of these problems will be given and practical tips and tricks will be discussed.

Aims and objectives of this session

Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) develops when microorganisms (such as bacteria, fungi, viruses, and parasites) mutate after being exposed to antimicrobial drugs (such as antibiotics, antifungals, antivirals, antimalarials, and anthelmintics). As a result, the drugs become ineffective and infections persist, increasing the risk of spread to others. AMR is an increasingly serious threat to global public health. Patients with infections caused by drug-resistant bacteria are at increased risk of worse clinical outcomes and death, and consume more healthcare resources than patients infected with non-resistant strains of the same bacteria. This session will explain the mechanism of bacterial resistance and J. Verkerk has the honour to be the first to present the European AMR Guidelines for Nurses.

Some evidence exists to suggest that perhaps as many as 80% of nurses have not had any training in the area of transgender care, and just over 10% of those who provide direct care indicate that they feel prepared to meet their patients' needs (Merrifield, 2016). Across Europe there is an unacceptably mixed picture regarding the care provided to transgender people. This has resulted in a lack of commonality in understanding and delivering high-quality standards of care. The aim of this session is to set out some of the principal areas of importance in understanding the needs, care practices and pathways necessary to meet the needs of transgender people.

- To identify the key issues that need to be understood in ensuring 'fair care for transgender people'

Among the reasons for this is the fear of embarrassment by both men and Healthcare Professionals (HPs), lack of knowledge and skills of HPs to broach the topic and offer appropriate responses to patients' psychosexual problems. Patients are often left in the dark about the possible psychosexual consequences of the different forms of treatment and do not know how, and where, to seek information and support. This session aims to outline a research-based approach to tackle this portfolio of intimate issues.

J Cockle-Hearne et al. www.bjcancer.com DOI:10.1038/bjc.2013.568). Unmet needs are related to the disease and the treatment and are also associated to the supportive care patients receive.

Nurses play an important role in helping patients with prostate cancer. First of all, nurses have to be able to recognise the unmet needs of the patient. Secondly, they should be able to plan useful interventions. The EONS is developing an App to assist nurses in this task. All unmet needs (including intimacy, physical, spiritual and psychological needs) are described and all proposed interventions are evidence-based.

Aims and objectives of this session

The first edition of the EAUN TRUS guided prostate biopsy guidelines was published in 2011. Since then, a lot of things have evolved. The guidelines have now been updated.

In the update the panel aimed to find answers to, for example:

- The sextant biopsy scheme already became obsolete. The 12-core scheme was recommended by the EAU, but is it really the optimal core scheme?
- Nowadays, it is commonly accepted that patients who use some oral anticoagulants can safely undergo a TRUS prostate biopsy without stopping their medication. Do we have any evidence about that? And what about the novel oral anticoagulants?
- In some countries, such as the UK, TRUS prostate biopsies are often performed by nurses. But are the quality and the safety the same when a biopsy is performed by a nurse or by a urologist?
- Patients need to be informed about the procedure of the TRUS prostate biopsy, about the potential pain, possible complications. But does patient information also help to reduce the physical and psychological impact of a prostate biopsy?

The 2019 review of the TRUS guidelines aims to give answers to all these questions. These guidelines will be useful for nurses (performing TRUS biopsies or not) as well as for urologists and physician assistants.
