Percutaneous nephrostomy is indicated for temporary and at times long term drainage of an obstructed renal collecting system. Major complications are haemorrhage, sepsis, pleural injury. Minor complications such as urinary tract infection, catheter dislodgement, catheter obstruction, urinary leakage, and inflammation of the skin at the site of insertion of the percutaneous catheter can be diagnosed and managed by the nurse practitioner or by the urology nurse.
